



This mare, Storm, was the first horse to carry that new saddle, Hands Up was the second. Storm foaled Marian's first Hands Up baby—a black filly.

This is the saddle used on ApHC Arrow Chief by Hands Up, in Frank Holmes book, <u>Spotted Pride</u>.

A highlight of the meeting was the showing of the film. "Appaloosa," with club members showing "movie-fan" enthusiasm for the production. Shows and races for the season were discussed with the Enid show set for Sept. 11.



One of the few horses who had success in the overnight races against Paint horses throughout the season, Zevi Joe earned the top award for the Appaloosa by virtue of his three consecutive wins this season.

Owned by Juan Mora of Sperry, Oklahoma and trained by Guillermo Valdivia, Zevi Joe was ridden in all of his wins this season by Paul Nieto. The Oklahoma-bred by Zevis Scooter Bug, from the Turf Bug B mare, Turf Made, won all of his races by at least one length. He crushed his maiden opponents in late April, winning by two lengths. Zevi Joe was bred by Jim and Donna Chronister, Pryor, Oklahoma. Turf Made is now owned by Scott and Ashley Bolding, and they sent this recent note to Jim and Donna:

Just thought I would update you and let you know that your girls are doing wonderful. Turf Made is fat, fat, and heavy in foal to Stelen of course, she has become very best friends with another old mare we have that is the same age, one of the last daughters of Orphan Drift, that is also in foal. They do absolutely everything together, and are good company for each other since we keep them close to the house in order to keep a close eye on them and provide them with extra TLC. The two young mares are also in great shape and heavy in foal. Everyone raves about all 3 mares when they see them, especially the two young mares. I've had lots of offers to sell, but they are staying put. We'll send pictures in the spring when we have babies!

The photo and caption on the left were found in an Appaloosa News from the 1960's. The event itself, however, apparently took place in 1940.




At the back table is Sooner member, Bill Conley, visiting with long time friends, Valerie (in red) and Phyllis Hustace.
